Chancel Choir Presents: Gospel Mass

The Chancel Choir will present Robert Ray's *Gospel Mass* during worship on April 24. This multi-movement setting of the mass is written in gospel and jazz styles, and will be presented with Bruce Williams on piano, Jerry Krause on bass guitar, and Ian Levine playing drums. The Chancel Choir has been rehearsing the *Gospel Mass* for the past couple of months, and looks forward to sharing their music and message with the congregation on April 24!

From an article in the Houston Chronicle, published in 2009:

Thirty years ago, Robert Ray sat down to write *Gospel Mass*, an experimental work, for a one-time performance. To his surprise, the piece caught on and became a seminal work of African-American music, performed by choirs and churches all over the world. There's no doubt in Ray's mind that God played a role in the writing of his now famous Mass, which sets the words from the Catholic Mass to the rhythm and harmony of African-American music.

"God controls everything I do," said Ray, a composer, conductor, and music educator. "It was written in about a two-week period. The hard part for me was not being a formally trained composer. The creativity was a result of divine inspiration. He was working with me." But it was also, he agrees, the right time and place. The Black Power movement was pushing cultural pride and identity, Martin Luther King Jr.'s message of inclusion still felt fresh, and white audiences were eager to embrace gospel music. And while the joyful toe-tapping mass reflects King's life and message, changes in the Roman Catholic Church also played a role.

The Gospel Mass, Ray explains, is a direct result of the Second Vatican Council in the mid-'60s and its decision to hold Masses in the language of the host country rather than in traditional Latin. The piece, he believes, struck an ecumenical chord that "allowed people of all denominations or faith to embrace the style."

Stewardship Focus for April LSSM OASIS House

The OASIS program is a residential home designed to meet the needs of teen boys being referred for the refugee foster care program. This program accepts nine unaccompanied alien youth and three unaccompanied alien minors, for a total of 12 children. Comprehensive case management, medical, dental, educational, and independent living skill development support are provided to youth who are part of this program and live in OASIS House. OASIS has house parents who reside in the home with the youth and provide a family setting with parental love and guidance.

One of the house parents, Richard Hand, will be coming to speak with us during a Social Justice gathering following worship on Sunday, April 17. To help provide for the residents of OASIS House, we will be collecting the following items throughout the month of April: shower curtains, twin bed sheet sets, household items, blankets. bath towels, wash cloths, and all kinds of toiletries. A collection basket will be placed in the entry way at church for all donated items.

Children of Aleppo

On Friday evening, April 22, at 7:00 p.m. we will be gathering at church for a showing of the PBS documentary *Children of Aleppo*. Pastor Kenneth Fouty from LSSM will be joining us to have a conversation following the movie. Please plan to join us for this event. Here is some information about the movie:

Five-year-old Sara dreams nearly every night that she is slowly surrounded by snipers who then open fire, shooting her again and again until she finally dies. Her older sister Farah, just 8 years old, can calmly tell the difference between a rocket and a tank shell, based solely on the sound it makes when fired close to her home.

The sisters - featured in a documentary called *Children of Aleppo*, live in a rebel-controlled part of the ancient Syrian city that is under near-constant siege from dictator Bashar al-Assad's regime. More than 10,000 children have died in Syria's bloody civil war when this documentary was made. That was when the war was stretching into its third year and, at that time, another million have been driven from the country as refugees. The war has now gone on for five years.

Assad is fighting both moderate rebels who want to set up a democratic society and al-Qaida linked terror groups who have co-opted the revolution from the original rebels. The first segment in the two-part *Frontline* documentary, called "Syria's Second Front," focuses on how the jihadis have taken over much of the north of the country, terrorizing civilians.

Photojournalist Marcel Mettelsiefen, who's traveled to the front lines of the country more than 20 times since the conflict began in 2011, filmed Farah and Sara and their family

for three days, as a way to spotlight the plight of children there.

The children live in a once middle-class suburb that now is bombed out and barren, filled with piles of shrapnel and abandoned homes. Their father, Abu Ali, commands a regiment of 300 rebel fighters who are working to topple the Assad regime. When this documentary was filmed, the family lived just two blocks away from the regime-controlled part of the city, and are thus at the front lines of the fight. The children's mother, Hala, said she at first gave her children cough syrup so they would sleep through the constant shelling. Then she told them the bombs were fireworks. Finally, she just told them the truth.

Now, her four children - Sara, Farah, 13-year-old Helen, and 14-year-old Mohammed - are used to beating a hasty retreat inside their apartment when the shelling sounds get louder or their father tells them to. They even help their father make bombs.

"When they threw a missile on that house over there, I died a big death," 5-year-old Sara tells Mettelsiefen. "I died and then lived again."

The sound of a rocket launch interrupts her sister Farah describing what it was like to

see the corpse of a fighter in the street by her house. "That was close by," Farah says, fear in her eyes. "It didn't explode. It didn't explode. That was a rocket. No, a tank shell. But it didn't explode."

Their older brother Mohammed tells the filmmaker that he doesn't have "any feelings left anymore."

"Children are children in every environment," Mettelsiefen said. "They have a tremendous way to adapt and cope."

But it was easy for him to see that these four children were being changed forever by the war raging around them.

"You could tell by the things they say, the dreams they have," he said. "I think the real effect and outcome of this trauma will be seen in a couple of years."

The children seem to have more hope than their parents that the conflict will end one day. In one poignant scene, the sisters sweep and clean a besieged and abandoned home, in case peace is ever restored and the occupants return.

It's been difficult and extremely dangerous for journalists to travel to the country and report on the conflict. At the time of this filming, The Committee to Protect Journalists estimated that 30 journalists were currently missing in Syria, many believed to be kidnapped by al Qaida-linked rebel groups.

Mettelsiefen was only able to film the girls for three days in September, before it became too dangerous for him to stay. One of the subjects he was filming - the older brother of a young rebel activist - was kidnapped by terrorists just days after Mettelsiefen was with him.

The filmmaker described the family at the heart of the documentary as "tremendously liberal." They named their three daughters Farah, Sara, and Helen to represent Islam, Judaism, and Christianity. The jihadis in the country, who have co-opted the largely secular and democratic uprising against Assad, have stolen the attention away from the moderates, he says. He wanted to correct that in a small way by telling this family's story.

"This revolution is not a revolution anymore; it's a civil war," Mettelsiefen said. "The ones who are suffering most are civilians."

Race Relations in the Greater Lansing Area Social Justice Gathering with Angela Waters Austin

On Sunday, April 3, Angela Waters Austin will be joining us following worship. Angela is the founder, president, and chief executive officer of One Love Global, Inc., a 501(c)3 non-profit corporation committed to peace, justice, and opportunity. Angela has over 20 years of experience in promoting racial equity, public and community relations, fund development marketing, special events, corporate sponsorships, program design, and management. Angela is also very involved in the Black Lives Matter movement as well as the work of My Brother's Keeper. Please join us following worship to hear what Angela has to say about race relations in the greater Lansing area.

Homeless Angels Project

We will be participating in the Homeless Angels Project. Homeless Angels is a street-based outreach program in Lansing. Their mission is to rebuild and restore faith in humanity through innovative ideas, programs, and events with the main goal of involving the community in real change for people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. We will be adopting one of the hotel rooms at the Magnuson Hotel and fixing it up so it will be available for homeless families.

We are beginning to work to raise \$250 to help with this project as we adopt a room and fix it up. We hope to get another \$250 from Thrivent to be used in this endeavor.

On Sunday, April 24, we will be taking a noisy offering for the Homeless Angels Project. Then, we are also planning a work day for Saturday, April 30, beginning at 10:00 a.m. We hope we will be able to get our adopted room ready for occupants. If you can join us, there is a sign-up sheet in the Narthex.

This team will explore and work to deepen our connections between faith and sustainability.
