

Beyond the Shut Door

Perhaps the most striking image in today's gospel is the one at the end of the parable: "And the door was shut." A shut door is often the imagery used to indicate the end of an opportunity. Worshiping communities may come up against various types of shut doors. Some may be found only occasionally, as when everyone seems happily connected and efforts to welcome newcomers are ignored. Other shut doors may be well known and a source of persistent frustration, as when positions of leadership are held by a select few, or when what happens inside the church rarely seems to connect with what is going on in the neighborhood or the world. A shut door is not the image one hopes for when considering congregational health or the mission of the church in the local community.

It is surprising to hear Jesus speaking about a shut door and the kingdom of heaven in the same parable, since he is the one who criticizes the scribes and Pharisees who "lock people out of the kingdom of heaven" (Matt. 23:13). It is also surprising because the shut door doesn't fit with Jesus' ministry of welcoming, healing, and eating with those whom society shunned. What does seem to fit is the invitation to meet the bridegroom and then go into the wedding banquet. Jesus is always encouraging his followers to join him, to come and see and share in the life he offers. But it is often our fear that shuts the door against Jesus.

Whether shut doors stand for opportunities gone or present obstacles, at the heart of discipleship is the willingness to be moved by instruction. As followers of Jesus we are given the challenge to remain with Jesus. Remaining with Jesus means hearing him tell us not to be afraid. Remaining with Jesus means that we can follow him into the banquet feast without delay.

Jesus tells the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

Some of the Thessalonians are worried that dead Christians will be excluded from the resurrection to eternal life when Christ comes again. Paul reassures them with the word of hope that all Christians, living or dead, will be raised into everlasting life with Christ.

A reading from 1 Thessalonians.


¹³We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. ¹⁴For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. ¹⁵For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. ¹⁶For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. ¹⁷Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. ¹⁸Therefore encourage one another with these words.







Reverse & Reach Out

Turn your "want list" into someone else's "need list" as you focus this Advent season on the journey to Bethlehem.

In a time of uncertainty, Mary and Joseph gathered what they had and traveled to Bethlehem to be counted in the census. What would they eat? Would they be warm? What did they need for themselves & a baby?

Reverse Advent: A Spiritual Discipline of Reaching Out

- 1. Gather 5 plain brown paper bags (one for each week of the Reverse Advent)
- 2. Decide as a family when and how you will practice this spiritual discipline of Reaching Out. You may choose to fill your bag and bring it in all at once or add one item each day during Advent. The choice is yours. (Note: Non-Perishable Food Items will be packed for delivery the week of December 10th).
- 3. At the end of each week (or Sunday morning), bring your filled bag (or monetary contribution) to worship and place it by the manger in the Narthex. Throughout the Advent season, our contributions will continue to fill the Stable with a special dedication Sunday, December 17th. Following the dedication, the items and money collected will be distributed to our Mission Partners who are on the front lines in serving the needs of our community.

<u>Week 4-December 10th</u> - **How would they care for a baby?** Place BABY ITEMS (bottles, diapers, wipes, etc.) in a bag for the infants and toddlers cared for by **Shared Pregnancy**. Talk about the many ways babies depend on their caregivers for basic needs. Pray for those who are learning to care for their infants and toddlers through the parenting classes and resources offered by Shared Pregnancy. Only New Items Please.

<u>Week 5-December 17th- How would they care for themselves?</u> Place BASIC TOILETRIES (toothpaste, toothbrush, deodorant, soap, shampoo, comb, brush etc.) in a bag for the housing insecure served by the **Lansing Rescue Mission.** Talk about the things you need each day to care for yourself. Pray for those who often have to choose between food and basic care items for survival.



Snares to Wares:

Keeping Wildlife Safe While Preserving Human Livelihood in Uganda Clara Lepard, MSU Graduate Student



In poor areas of Uganda, a number of residents earn their living by snaring animals to sell for meat in their villages. The metal snares they use are made from old vehicle tires, readily available along the roadsides. Unfortunately, these same snares are also used by poachers to snare endangered wildlife. Removing the snares from the landscape solves only part of the problem. Animals are safer, but what about the humans who depend upon their "catch" to earn their living? Robert Montgomery, assistant professor in the Fisheries and Wildlife Department at MSU has developed an initiative called "Snares to Wares" that addresses both problems. Clara Lepard, a senior at MSU studying zoology, spent last summer working with this innovative program in Uganda. She is eager to share with us her experiences in words and pictures.
