

I find our consumer driven culture pulls and draws us into the hustle and bustle of the holiday season earlier and earlier each year. However, all the hustle and bustle, the spectrum of emotions we experience during this busy season, the giving and receiving of presents, the many commitments that must be met, and all that shapes our experience of Christmas will soon be over. Christmas will come to a climax with the celebration of the birth of a baby and the whirlwind will soon be behind us. And, truthfully, at that time many of us will probably find ourselves exhausted and spent. However, is that all there is? Is there anything of lasting significance that we take with us as we begin a new year?

The Rev. Dr. Barbara Rossing will be joining us to speak on Revelation and Ecology. Dr. Rossing is professor of New Testament at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, where she has taught since 1994. She loves to teach and preach about the Bible, including the Bible's role in public life.

An avid environmentalist, Rossing is involved with environmental initiatives at the seminary. Rossing received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Carleton College, the master of divinity degree from Yale University Divinity School and the doctor of theology degree from Harvard University.

She served as pastor of a congregation in Minnesota, director for Global Mission Interpretation for the American Lutheran Church, pastor at Holden Village Retreat Center, Chelan, Wash., and chaplain at Harvard University Divinity School.

Rossing has lectured and preached widely, including synod assemblies and global mission events for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), as well as ecumenical theological conferences. She has served on the executive committee and council of the Lutheran World Federation (2003-2010), and chaired the Lutheran World Federation's theology and studies committee. She currently serves on the advisory committee for *The Lutheran Magazine*.

As a public theologian her media appearances have included "CBS Sixty Minutes" as well as The History Channel, National Geographic, Living the Questions, and numerous print and radio interviews. Her publications include *The Rapture Exposed: The Message of Hope in the Book of Revelation* (Basic Books, 2004); *The Choice Between Two Cities: Whore, Bride and Empire in the Apocalypse* (Trinity Press, 1999); two volumes of the *New Proclamation* commentary (Fortress Press, 2000 and 2004); a nine-session Bible study, *Journeys Through Revelation: Apocalyptic Hope for Today* (Presbyterian Women, 2010); and articles and book chapters on the Apocalypse and ecology.

GREEN TEAM NEWS

THIS MONTH, THE GREEN TEAM SHARES A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ERICK JOHNSON, MEMBER OF OUR SYNOD ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP TASK FORCE.

Anticipatory Communities

In his book *Earth Honoring Faith*, ethicist Larry Rasmussen speaks about the importance of faith communities in building a sustainable planet. Faith communities can be "anticipatory communities," communities of moral formation that are seeking to live out the change that is needed in our world. In the words of Gandhi: we must be the change we seek if we expect change to happen.

Rasmussen says: "Prophetic symbols and practices, even modest ones move people in a direction that lets them embrace bigger changes when the moment is ripe and options are forced. Small changes are often the leaven of a better order. They are like water softening up compacted soil, allowing new seeds to grow. Consider climate change. Hoisting solar panels to rooftops here and there, starting community gardens, and reforesting floodplains, one community at a time, will not do what only bioregional, national, and international legislations and law enforcement can. Beijing, Washington, Moscow and the U.N. count more for this than my neighborhood. Yet, there's no such thing as a useless community garden, a useless photo-voltaic system, or a useless forest as preparation for systemic change."

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change recently said that unless the world cuts carbon emissions by half by 2030 there will be dire consequences for our planet. In light of this our work to conserve energy, recycle and compost, change our lifestyles bit by bit, our community gardens, congregational green teams—these things may seem very small. But anticipatory communities are and will be of vital importance in the great work that lies ahead of us.

The Lansing Area Solar Users Network (LaSUN) has started a new free program. Solar Energy Advisors are local solar owners who have volunteered to assist fellow residents by either answering their questions by email or phone or by arranging a visit to their home to see their solar system and answer questions. Personal Pronouns - What, Why, and How?

As we continue to live into our mission to be fully welcoming and inclusive to all and thus fulfilling our designation as a Reconciling in Christ community, let's take a few minutes to look into personal pronouns.

What are personal pronouns? In English, whether we realize it or not, people frequently refer to us using pronouns when speaking about us. Often, when speaking of a singular human in the third person, these pronouns have a gender implied -- such as "he" to refer to a man/boy or "she" to refer to a woman/girl. These associations are not always accurate or helpful. The most common personal pronouns are he/him/his, she/her/hers, they/them/theirs (used in the singular, not plural). Just as people determine what name or nickname they want to be called, people determine which pronouns they want to have used when referring to them.

Why care about personal pronouns? Often, people make assumptions about the gender of another person based on the person's appearance or name. These assumptions aren't always correct, and the act of making an assumption (even if correct) sends a potentially harmful message -- that people have to look a certain way to demonstrate the gender that they are or are not. Using someone's correct personal pronouns is a way to respect them and create an inclusive environment, just as using a person's name can be a way to respect them. This is especially important for people who are non-binary and do not identify as male or female.

How do I properly use someone's personal pronouns? The first step is to make sure you know someone's pronouns before using any. Don't assume that because someone looks like what society has constructed as a typical masculine appearance that they use he/him/his, etc. If you don't know someone's pronouns, get to know them and open the conversation so they can share. Just like getting to know someone's name, you can get to know someone's pronouns the same way. "Hi, I'm Rich, and my pronouns are he/him/his". This opens the conversation for them to share their name and pronouns. If there isn't a way to find out someone's pronouns, it would be best to refer to them by name, or use the gender neutral pronouns of they/them/theirs. At Faith, when you wear your nametag, we encourage you to add your pronouns. Either write them on there, or use a pronoun pin.

What are pronoun pins? These are little pins that you can wear that have the pronouns you use, so that when others see it, they know your pronouns. It is very beneficial for people who use pronouns that differ from what society normally would assume for them. By showing that we share our pronouns, it creates a safe space for them to share theirs. There are two plastic containers on the counter in the narthex with he/him/his, she/her/hers, and they/them/theirs pins in them. Please take one to wear at church or other places.
