PASTOR'S CORNER

*Yet, O Lord, you are our parent; we are the clay, and you are our potter;  
we are all the work of your hand. Isaiah 64:7*

We are entering a new church year. Advent is the first season, and it is a mixed season. It is one that is somewhat penitential, but hopeful at the same time. Advent is our time to prepare for Christmas as well as the second coming of Christ. Some churches have even elongated the season past the four Sundays we normally celebrate.

It is the season where we talk about waiting and being prepared. The first Sunday in Advent we hear about the second coming of Christ. Advent two and three talk about John the Baptist. Advent three in our advent wreath has a pink candle which symbolizes rejoicing. Advent four this year is talking about Mary's visit from the angel Gabriel.

Waiting and preparing takes planning and patience. There often seems to be more waiting in Advent when we are out in the community getting prepared for Christmas. Part of waiting is learning how to relax in the midst of it. Even during preparations, we often find things changing, due to variables.

Isaiah reminded the people who had returned from exile that it would take time and patience to rebuild the temple and their homes. God had brought them back home and what they saw was probably very depressing. Isaiah was suggesting that they continue to put their trust in God. He was suggesting that they were called to be clay and that God was the potter and would bring about new life for them.

To be the clay means to be flexible, to be vulnerable. So often we decide how something is going to go and when it doesn't go that way, we become angry and disappointed. Sometimes we have not considered all of the variables and we set ourselves up for this to happen.

As we move through this time of transition, I suggest that we not focus on how things are going to go. God has a plan for Faith, but it takes time for it to unfold. Part of being ready for it is to allow the Holy Spirit to work us through it. Since we are the clay, individually and corporately, we are called to be flexible and vulnerable.

We are called to listen and ponder. This is what waiting and preparing are all about. This is what it means to be the clay and allow God to mold us into the people that God wants us to be. When we start a process, we cannot fully know what the end the product will be.

During this Advent season, we are challenged to wait and prepare. We are challenged to relax into this in order to hear and see God in Jesus Christ at work. This is when we will experience the hope of new life.



# DECEMBER 24

## Advent IV

### 10:00 am:

This year, we will be doing Advent Lessons and Carols based on the “O Antiphons” or “O Come, O Come, Emmanuel”. The O Antiphons are a set of medieval refrains originally used before and after the singing of the Magnificat. They were in use already in the eighth century. Each invokes the Messiah under a different title derived from the Old Testament. This title is then amplified and followed by an appeal to “come” and save us in a particular way.

Around the twelfth century, they were collected into a Latin verse hymn, which was later translated by John Mason Neale, finally becoming the beloved Advent hymn “O come, O come, Emmanuel” (ELW 257, LBW 34). (The version in Evangelical Lutheran Worship restores two original stanzas that were omitted in the LBW version.) These antiphons form the structure of this service.

They are pointed for chanting, but they may be spoken. The corresponding stanza of “O come, O come, Emmanuel” is sung after each antiphon.

### 4:00 pm

There will be a Children’s Sermon, Carols, Communion and Candle Lighting. There will be special music by Cody and Andy Boyan. Prelude Music will begin at 3:45 pm.

### 8:00 pm

There will be Brass, Carols, Chancel Choir, Communion and Candle Lighting. Prelude Music will begin at 7:45 pm.

### December 31 - 10:00 am

This will be a service of Lessons and Carols with Communion. We will also be doing stories and the background of the Carols.

# *The Advent Wreath*

One of the best-known customs for the season is the Advent wreath. The wreath and winter candle-lighting amid growing darkness strengthen some of the Advent images found in the Bible. The unbroken circle of greens is an image of everlasting life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, or the wheel of time itself. Christians use the wreath as a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of everlasting life. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light. Sometimes the wreath is embellished with natural dried flowers or fruit. Its evergreen branches lead the household and the congregation to the evergreen Christmas tree. In many homes, the family gathers for prayers around the wreath.

# REDISCOVER ADVENT FOR A HOLY CHRISTMAS

In accordance with Jesus' promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home. Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish.

**-2 Peter 3:13-**

With fighting in Israel and Ukraine, political gridlock in the U.S., worsening climate change around the world, and other deep problems, 2023 is ending on a sad note for humanity.

That's a good reason to embrace Advent this year. Lost amid the nonstop commercialism of Christmas, Advent is the church's traditional season of careful preparation and waiting – two things our instant, “have-it-now” culture abhors.

If we don't prepare our hearts and minds for the miracle of Jesus – Emmanuel, God with us – how will Christmas be anything more than just another secular shopping season? How can we expect the arrival of Christ to give us strength, courage, insight and wisdom to deal with these troubled times?

Embracing Advent helps us to be good stewards of the Christmas season by reminding us that it's not about Santa Clause or shopping or parties, but by the miracle of God arriving in human form to save us from ourselves.

Here are some ways to embrace Advent:

- Find – and follow – an Advent devotional.
- Increase your disciplines of prayer, scripture reading, and worship.
- As much as possible, hold off celebrating Christmas until December 25.
- Remember we need Christ to live fully as God intended.

Advent prepares us to receive Jesus with a full and joyful heart, to live in the abundance Jesus promises.

On October 29, 2023, the Faith Transition Team held a Leadership Conversation. In attendance were members of the Transition Team, Church Council Members and Committee and Group Chairs.

The objective of this meeting was to gather information to determine what duties/activities are conducted by the various Committees and Groups to determine "What Faith Should Look Like in The Future."

The information that was developed will be presented to the Church Council for evaluation and consideration. This review could determine the need to reconfigure or restructure these existing Committees or Groups.

Upon review of this data, a meeting will be held with the entire Congregation in early 2024 to gather their input to move forward with the Call Process.
